YOGA WITH MATT FROM LITTLE WREN YOGA

Often when we think of yoga we think of slim younger people in expensive sports kit, doing crazy postures that make them look more like contortionists than ordinary folk. These images on social media often make us think it's not worth having a go as my body is not like that or could even move like that.

However, the essence of true yoga couldn't be further away from this modern image. Yoga is roughly four thousand years old and developed in ancient India as a way of bringing together, the balancing of the mind, body, and spirit. The word yoga means to yoke, to unite all the elements of human experience.

Often people say I can't do yoga as I am not fit enough, or I am not flexible but interestingly the teachings of yoga encourage to accept yourself as you are, not how you would like to be and start from there. You start the practice with your body as it is, adjust your practice and then over time your flexibility will increase.

The beauty of yoga is you start where you are and gently over the weeks your body becomes stronger and more flexible in a gentle way.

Over the last few years there has been a lot of scientific research into the benefits of meditation and yoga, and lots of encouraging things are being found out.

Here is a few:

Yoga improves strength, balance and flexibility:

The slow movements and deep breathing increase blood flow and warm up muscles, while holding a pose can build strength.

Yoga can help with back pain relief:

Yoga is as good as basic stretching for easing pain and improving mobility in people with lower back pain. The American College of Physicians recommends yoga as a first-line treatment for chronic low back pain.

Yoga relaxes you, to help you sleep better:

Research has shown that a consistent yoga routine can help you get in the right mindset and prepare your body to fall asleep and stay asleep.

Yoga can mean more energy and brighter moods:

You may feel increased mental and physical energy, a boost in alertness and enthusiasm, and fewer negative feelings after getting into a routine of practicing yoga.

Yoga helps you manage stress levels:

Scientific evidence shows that yoga supports stress management, mental health, mindfulness, healthy eating, weight loss and quality sleep.

Yoga classes can connect you with a supportive community:

Participating in yoga classes can ease loneliness and provide support and friendship.

Yoga practice and philosophy promotes better self-care, self awareness and self acceptance:

Research has even shown that in prison environments it can lower a person's reactivity and make them less likely to flare up in situations as they develop a calmer, more accepting approach to their situation.

Give it a go:

One of the ancient philosophical ideas of yoga encourages us just to be open to the possibility that there might be some truth in it. It encourages you to go by your experience rather than being told this is 'right or true'. So why not just give yoga a go and see if it works for you.

If you would like to try a yoga session; Matt Albury; is a 500 YTT qualified and registered yoga teacher. The sessions are from 09:15 to 10:30 on Monday Mornings at Didmarton Village Hall. The first taster session is always a free session.

TECH TALK

Going Large with Google

Google's search algorithm is improving all of the time, but sometimes you don't quite get what you were expecting, so here are a few tips to help you make the most of Google and indeed any Search Engine.

Quotations (" ") to search for the exact phrase: If you search for *Patrick Stewart young*, you will get results that have all those words, but not necessarily in the order you search. By adding quotations and searching "*Patrick Stewart young*," you will get only results that include all those words in that order.

Exclude terms with a minus (-) symbol: Use the minus symbol to exclude all the terms you don't want, e.g. *best apps -android* for results that omit roundups of top Android apps.

Dashes: Put a dash before a word that you want to include in your site: *jaguar -animal*

Use 2 full stops (..) between numbers to search for a range: To narrow results to a date or price range, use full stops in between the numbers. Looking for a computer within a certain price range? Search *computer £500..£900* to only get results that fit into that range.

Add site: to search a single website: If you want results from one specific website, use *site:* followed directly by the site domain. *site:allaboutsites.co.uk*

Search File Types: If you're looking for a specific kind of file on the internet, use *filetype:* to search only for uploaded files that match your query. For example, use *filetype:pdf* to find a PDF or *filetype:doc* to locate a Microsoft Office document.

Search Related Websites: Search for similar websites by using the *related:* to show related results. Searching *related:amazon.com* brings up results including Walmart and Overstock. Searching *related:google.com* shows Yahoo and Bing.

LEIGHTERTON PRIMARY SCHOOL



ANZAC Day

The whole community here at Leighterton are very proud of our ANZAC links. The ANZACs are the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps who were based at Leighterton during the First World War.

During World War 1, the Royal Flying Corps was established and near the end of the war, Australia set up its own Air Corps. The first detachments were sent to the UK in 1917 and the First Training Wing of the Australian Flying Corps was established in January 1918. Leighterton hosted Number 2 Station and Squadrons 7 and 8 came here.

The runways were grass. Trainees came to the squadrons once they had completed six weeks basic training and passed a written exam in aeronautics, Morse code and the theory of artillery. They would fly 12 times with an instructor, each flight lasting only 15 minutes, before going solo. They would complete four hours of solo flights before going on to advanced training. Here at Leighterton, training was in two seater planes. The planes used were Sopwith Pups, Sopwith Camels, the Royal Aircraft Factory SE5A and Avro 504. The Sopwith Camel had particularly poor handling characteristics.

The ANZACS became well known locally for their daredevil flying. The ANZACs left the Stations on 11th May 1919 and the air strips at Leighterton reverted to farmland again. Twenty four of the ANZAC pilots who were trained at Leighterton and who were killed during the war are buried in the cemetery here.

Each year, on the Sunday closest to ANZAC Day, which is on 25th April, representatives from the Royal British Legion, the Royal Air Force and other community groups, parade from Leighterton Primary School, through the village, to the cemetery, where a service of remembrance is held to commemorate the ANZACs who are buried in Leighterton. During the service, the children from our school lay sprigs of rosemary on the graves of the servicemen and they call the roll of the men who died. Rosemary is an ancient symbol of remembrance and had become a fitting symbol to remember those who have served and died. It is a traditional symbol of commemoration in Australia and many wear sprigs of this herb on ANZAC Day, in memory.

At St Andrew's church, in Leighterton, a Roll of Honour can be seen mentioning each of the men's names.

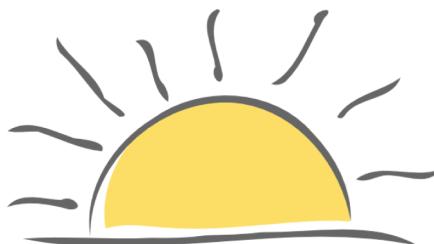
Research shows intermittent fasting is great for type 1 and type 2 Diabetes again as long as it's discussed with the doctor or Diabetes nurse.

Not Enough Time

To quickly chill a single bottle or can, wrap it in kitchen roll and run under the tap. Put into a plastic bag (so it doesn't stick to the freezer) freeze for 5-10 minutes (setting a timer helps!). Open and enjoy!

To save changing the water in flower vases, add a few drops of bleach to keep the water fresh and flowers lasting longer

Save time picking away at the clingfilm by using beeswax or silicone covers. Saves on using plastic too.

Use toothpaste to quickly remove the marks from Chrome taps. Rub it in with a damp cloth or finger then rinse it to leave a shiny finish.

For time saving fruit drinks fill empty citrus peel halves e.g. orange, lemon, lime with water and freeze them. Then when you need an instant drink just add them to a jug of water.

J.J.'S GARDENING BLOG – looking forward to spring

Have you managed to prune the roses? Well you have almost missed the boat if you haven't. But never fear, they will survive but will flower rather late. Perhaps give them a pep talk and cheer them up.

If you are tying any branches back remember to use garden string with a figure of eight so the branch doesn't rub against the fence or wall and damage itself.

Don't get over excited about getting the annuals planted out. We could get some late cold weather. If you have a light warmish place indoors, plant some seeds. You can plant small amounts of the packet over a period, it will give you a longer flowering time.

If it's not very nice outside, go to the shed and check on the plants in pots, do they need the next size pot with some new compost? Bear in mind, that Agapanthus prefer to be very snug in their pot to flower well, they are also drought tolerant. If its a nice warmish day move containers in groups of three or five, near a wall or under a shrub. Keep an eye on the weather, as with the annuals, it may be a case of bringing pots in and out for three or four days to help them along.

If you have sensibly not tidied up penstemon plants to protect them from cold, now is probably the time to do so.

Just keep on top of any small weeds, and mulch which looks good but gives the plants a good chance to blossom. Don't despair if even after the five star treatment a plant gives up. Some take several years to bloom and some others have reached their life span, most herbaceous plants are not oak trees.

If you need something to fill a space or to add interest over the whole season look into grasses. Miscanthus is really useful, upright, about a metre tall and compact, there are plenty of others and worth researching.

A lovely small iris which will be available in pots now is Katherine Hodgkin, and can be planted out later too.

Remember to turn the compost bin. This is not absolutely necessary but it will speed the rotting up.

Plants purchased from a shop or nursery will usually have enough fertiliser in the compost to last for six weeks, so no need to add more.

As the days get sunnier remove slugs, don't hope they will just go away!

Wash the garden furniture be ready for a heat wave.

VICAR'S LETTER April 2023

Dear Parishioners,

At last, Easter is almost here now, and the daffodils will be waving joyfully in our villages.

Easter celebrates the resurrection which is at the heart of the Christian faith. This is the Resurrection which undergirds a Christian understanding of life beyond this world.

Our Theology of eternal life, is based upon our union with Christ in his Death and Resurrection, which we have sacramentally, through our Baptism.

In days gone by, all Baptisms would have happened at Easter. Lent would have been a time for preparing the catechists for their Baptism at this time.

Much popular Christian thinking, simply sees Baptism as a welcome to a baby into the world, and this important Christian teaching outlined above, is missed. Our union with Christ in his Death and Resurrection through Baptism, is a belief commonly held by all denominations and churches.

Some traditions, dunk a person completely under the water, whereas most Church of England Baptisms happen in a font with a shell or a hand, sprinkling water on the head of a person.

The sprinkling of water is repeated sometimes on a coffin, or at a Confirmation service - to remind the faithful of their baptism.

In Brief—the Jewish Holiday of Passover

Passover, or Pesach in Hebrew, is one of the Jewish religion's most sacred and widely observed holidays. In Judaism, Passover commemorates the story of the Israelites' departure from ancient Egypt, which appears in the Hebrew Bible's books of Exodus, Numbers and Deuteronomy, among other texts. The weeklong festival is observed with a number of important rituals, including a traditional Passover meal known as a seder, the removal of leavened products from the home, the substitution of matzo for bread and the retelling of the exodus tale.

Passover 2023 will be from sundown on April 5, 2022, to sundown on April 13, 2022. The date of Passover changes each year because the date is set not by the Gregorian Calendar, but by the lunar-based Hebrew calendar. It always occurs during the Hebrew month of Nisan.

One of the most important Passover rituals is removing all leavened food products (known as chametz) from their home before the holiday begins and abstaining from them throughout its duration.

Instead of bread, a type of flatbread called matzo is eaten. According to tradition, this is because the Hebrews fled Egypt in such haste that there was no time for their bread to rise or perhaps because matzo was lighter and easier to carry through the desert.

Easter Facts

Why Eggs? - Early Christians in Mesopotamia dyed eggs in the period after Easter. The practice was adopted by the Orthodox Churches, and from there it spread into Western Europe. Eggs represent new life and rebirth, and it's thought that this ancient custom was absorbed into Easter celebrations. In the medieval period, eating eggs was forbidden during Lent (the 40 days before Easter) so on Easter Sunday, tucking into an egg was a real treat!

The (quick version) Origin of Easter—Easter originated as an ancient pagan celebration of the spring equinox. In Christianity, the day was dedicated to observing the resurrection of Jesus Christ, celebrated around the time of the Jewish Passover.
