We saw an increase in the traffic passing through, especially in the afternoon, probably due to the Autumn colours at the Arboretum.

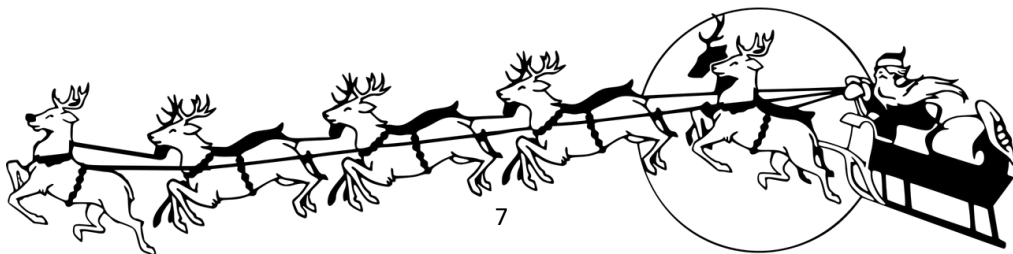
Increased traffic usually means slower speeds through the village but we still recorded 10 doing 40mph or above including one at 52mph.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR REPORT - NOVEMBER

Cotswold District Council: There was no full council meeting this month but at Overview and Scrutiny we reviewed the waste collection implementation (see below) and the draft budget with the medium-term financial strategy. The latter caused me great concern as it shows CDC reserves running out in 2025/26 and a significant budget gap with an associated borrowing requirement in 2026/27. The Chief Financial Officer highlighted this was a worst-case scenario and is dependent on any new settlement from the government, but it may need the administration to take drastic action to avoid issues. Presently they are forecasting around £4m to cover the capital cost of replacement bin lorry fleet, but are working to mitigate this by spreading the need for a wholesale replacement in one hit. However, 5 years ago the reserves stood at £13.4m with a further £7m in property, and they are forecast to be completely depleted in the next few years.

While there have certainly been issues created by the previous government's sporadic settlement, much of the over spend is self-inflicted – this includes the costs for breaking up and the in-sourcing of Publica service company resources (enduring impact of c£400k per year plus project costs), and they have just announced the arrival of two new communications roles costing a combined £250,000pa.

Bins: At Overview and Scrutiny Cllr Evamy gave a verbal update, with the Ubico management contributing. When the new rounds were introduced the Ubico management failed to inform their employees that instead of finishing work mid-afternoon, they would be required complete a full day. This obviously caused individuals urgent issues with childcare and other commitments, but management were shocked that a significant number of staff suddenly went off 'sick'! The management also failed to tell workers that they had fitted tracking technology in the trucks. It has taken many weeks to rectify these issues that could so easily have been avoided with sensible advance dialogue with the crews. Both Cllr Evamy and Ubico have offered unreserved apologies for the inconvenience caused to residents.

The good news is that most issues have been resolved, and the new rounds will save £500k per year for a modest outlay of £91k (including the £75k they forgot to put in the budget!).

Please continue to report missed collections to me as well as the official route at CDC - if I hear nothing, I will be delighted!

Roads: My attempt to get recompense for a damaged tyre appears to be over. The local magistrates court has 'set aside' my claim on a technicality and I don't have the knowledge on how to overcome the required information. I have tried to get some legal representation but have been unable to get a law firm to help. So, GCC's expensive lawyers have once again been successful in fending off a perfectly valid claim for modest recompense. I do wonder how much more it has cost the taxpayer in legal fees versus refunding my burst tyre!

Pothole season is now in full swing, and I reported several holes the area, including a huge, repeat offender near Cherington lake – another example of wasting taxpayer's money by dropping blobs of cold tarmac rather than fixing the cause, which in this case is spring water constantly flowing across the road. It was quickly fixed, with... more blobs of cold tar!

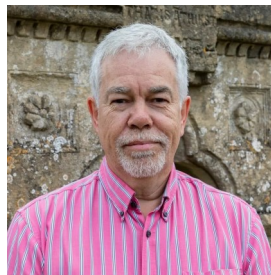
Family Farm Tax: Whatever your feelings on the recent budget, the 'APR' change means that inheritance tax of 20% will effectively apply on the full value of farms and rural estates above £1m. In my rural, agricultural ward, farming food for the nation does not pay the bills. Most farmers have to find creative ways to stay afloat, by doing two or more jobs or starting up a sideline business as they make stupidly little income from farming, even though they work long, lonely hours. Farmers tend to be asset-rich and cash poor. Farming is not a popular vocation due to the low pay, difficult work and increasing risk of having crops ruined by extreme weather. Farming is like nursing, it is a vocation, often handed down from father to child. If they cannot afford to pass their business down to relatives, the family farm as we know it will die out, along with all the localised knowledge - every farm is unique having different topography, soils, weather exposure etc. and food security will decline. Family farmers are caretakers of our landscapes, the countryside would look completely different without them. Or perhaps we could build houses!

Didmarton Village Hall and Community Committee will purchase 'blanket' licence for the year.

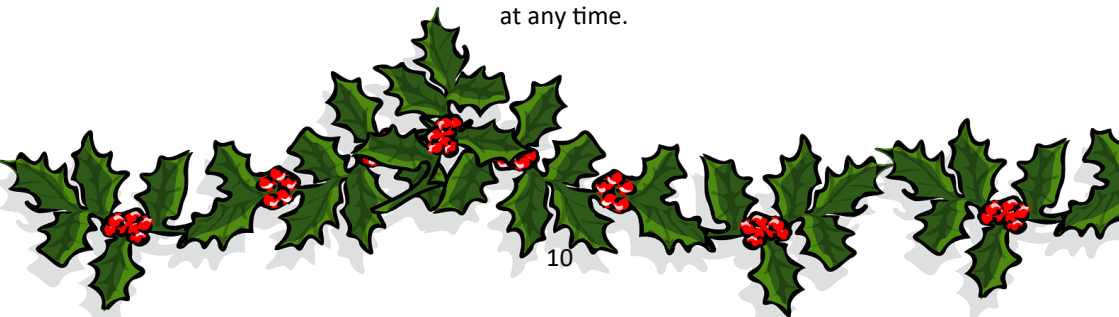

A POLITICALLY CORRECT CHRISTMAS

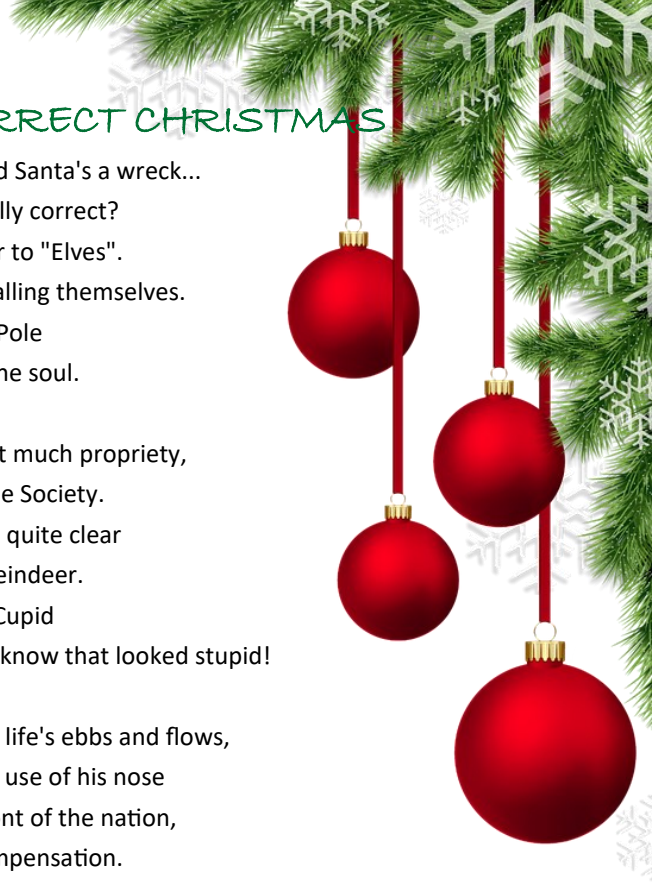
Tw'as the night before Christmas and Santa's a wreck...

CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS—THE YULE LOG

The original Nordic and Germanic invaders – Angles, Saxons, and Jutes – were not Christian, but were still engaged in winter solstice celebrations around the 25th December. This was the festival known as Yule, still celebrated by Neo-Pagans across the world, and remembered indirectly by those indulging in a Yule Log this Christmas.

The Yule log was burned in honor of the sun god and to ensure the sun's return after the solstice. Lighting the log symbolized the triumph of light over darkness.

As Christianity spread through Europe, many pagan customs, including the Yule log, were adopted into Christmas celebrations. The log burning became a Christian symbol of Christ's light bringing warmth and renewal to the world.

Harvest Festival

YOUR MIND & BODY MATTERS

An American doctor called Dr Mark Hyman frequently posts (in my opinion) very interesting articles on Instagram which are worth reading and a regular podcast, also worth listening to. The following was from a recent posting.

It would appear that many of us as we grow older start to breath through our mouth whilst we are sleeping. This is doing more damage than we think and impacts how much oxygen we take in. It also has an affect on our oral health and over time it can even change our facial structure. A book called "Jaws: A Hidden Epidemic" looks how mouth breathing and "soft diets" have led to issues in craniofacial development. Studies go onto show that our airways function is impaired leading to sleep apnea, (which obesity can also cause).

Nasal breathing isn't just about comfort, it's about function. When we breath through our nose we filter out pathogens via the nasal microbiome (seems this microbiome is needed everywhere).

The increase of oxygen uptake is 20% more than mouth breathing.

Nasal breathing also supports optimal sinus function which goes on the help regulate airflow and pressure.

Mouth breathing over time can go on to change our facial structure, As the jaw isn't properly engaged during mouth breathing, it can be shifted backwards causing a recessed chin. Droopy eyes can start to appear due to less stimulation and proper use of the upper facial muscles and sinuses. When the tongue isn't resting on the roof of the mouth, narrower dental arches happen leading to crowded teeth and misaligned bites.

The harder the food, the stronger jaws are. Chewing tough food helps develop the jaw, align teeth and avoid braces and orthodontic intervention. Chewing activates growth signals in the jawbone.

Try taping your mouth before sleep just a little tape vertically NOT HORIZONTALLY and see if it makes a difference, you may need to try it several times before you get used to nose breathing.

December 2014 AS 'TWAS 10 YEARS AGO

Didmarton as it is recorded in the 'DYDDI digest'

(This magazine has been published every month since No. 1 in October 1975.)

Very much a breather between Bonfire Night and Christmas the December edition delighted in the success of linking with Hallowe'en and a good night and gathering on the field on 31st October. David Russell had again created a magnificent bonfire, Helen Russell and Jeff Eadon had fired up the village BBQ, watched by Adrian Jarvis who was happily responsible for a beer barrel and the beer had been provided by the Kings Arms and Holford Arms. Sarah Bugg was helping the children with witches' costumes and Gina Ellis and Henry Murdock were on standby for first-aiding. Sarah Barrett was thanked for the clearing up efforts after the evening and the whole event had been overseen by DCC members. £700 surplus was achieved on the night.

Reports from Didmarton Football Club were not quite so successful and may be left to history, and a Bingo Night by the MAD Club had relied on the support of non-residents.

Nevertheless, the MAD (Mature Adults of Didmarton) Club was going strongly with events already booked monthly well into 2015: A lunch out, a demonstration from The Cupcake Company of Tetbury, a Beetle Drive, an evening with 'The Ukulele Man'; Poems, Anecdotes and Ditties from Paul Evans, Horse Racing, and a talk on the wild flowers of the Cotswolds taking the club through to July with more being organised for the months of Autumn.

The English folk figure "Father Christmas" originally wore green robes which eventually turned red over time. This was mainly due to St Nicholas, whose legend modern portrayals of Father Christmas are based on, often appearing in paintings and illustrations wearing red-coloured robes.

The Dutch character Sinterklaas also wore red and white was brought to America by Dutch immigrants in the 19th century.

Thomas Nast's drawings of Santa for Harper's Weekly in the 1860s and 1880s helped establish the modern image of Santa. Nast's 1881 image of Santa in a red suit became something of an official portrait.

In the 1930s, Swedish artist Haddon Sundblom's drawings of a rotund Santa in a red coat for Coca-Cola ads helped cement the image of Santa in red

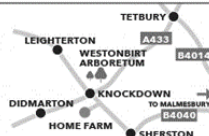
