Foraging around Didmarton

Field mushrooms (*Agaricus campestris*) often appear in meadows and pastures after rain. They have white caps, pink gills darkening to brown, and a pleasant, earthy aroma. Always harvest with caution: never eat mushrooms unless you are completely certain of their identity. Fatal lookalikes, like the death cap, grow in similar places. Use a trusted field guide, consult experts, and only collect fresh, well-developed specimens. we have a lot of Yellow Stainers growing in the fields around Didmarton. These mushrooms look exactly the same as edible Field mushrooms but if you peel the skin back on the cap the flesh underneath will start to go yellow. They also smell strongly of carbolic soap when cooking. They will make you quite ill if eaten.



SPEED WATCH SEPTEMBER SESSIONS

Following a short summer break the speed watch team returned to duty in September. In our absence our work was continued with several visits by the Police Camera Van and by a group of Police Cadets who were being trained.

You might have spotted a photo of them taken by the Wilts and Glos Standard which was taken by the Village Hall.

In September we managed to do all of our 9 planned sessions despite heavy showers, thunder and lightning and hailstones on the Monday.

The Camera Van was also at St Lawrence's on one of the afternoons.

You can notice from the summary that we recorded a high number of vehicles speeding, many of which were well in excess of the 30mph, probably because there was less traffic generally on the road (more traffic = slower speeds, less traffic = higher speeds).

We were also able to do a slightly later session and an earlier session, outside of the more usual 'normal' hours; this was probably our last chance to do an evening session due to the fading light but we are aiming to resume these late sessions next Spring.

My Cat - Blaze




Last month I wrote about my summer tour of the South Cotswolds, where I met so many of you and saw inspiring local initiatives. As we move into autumn, our villages and towns are preparing for harvest festivals – a moment to give thanks, but also to reflect on the challenges behind this year's harvest.

Farmers across the constituency have faced a difficult season, with a shortage of rainfall through spring and summer. Since becoming your MP 15 months ago, I have spent time with many local farmers, learning more about the pressures they face. What I hear time and again is their resilience and resourcefulness – and the vital role they play, not only in producing our food, but in caring for our countryside.

Farming is about much more than crops or livestock. Farmers protect nature, improve rivers, prevent flooding, and safeguard the landscapes we all value. Their work underpins our food security and our environment alike.



COTSWOLD DISTRICT COUNCIL UPDATE

Cotswold District Council (CDC):** The next full Council meeting will be held on 24th September at 6:00pm.

Overview & Scrutiny (O&S): We reviewed quarter one financial performance, which was broadly on track, though cemetery income is already £38k below forecast. I asked whether this is seasonal or reflects a longer-term shift away from burials; officers will compare trends in neighbouring districts.

On council performance, I raised concerns about Planning Enforcement. Recently I have been contacted about several cases in Grumbolds Ash that required prompt action, but responses from the team remain limited, even though there are now over 600 outstanding cases. While some matters involve confidentiality, councillors and residents should expect better communication. A member briefing later this month will revisit this issue.

Housing Targets: CDC has received a response from Baroness Taylor of Stevenage to the Leader's recent letter objecting to new housing targets. The council had urged consideration of the district's unique development constraints and asked for a pause while the Local Plan is updated. Baroness Taylor acknowledged these challenges but stressed that all councils must contribute to meeting national housing demand. She underlined the government's affordability criteria and planning goals but did not agree to review the targets or provide interim protection against speculative development, leaving concerns unresolved.

Avening Stream: I expect the long-awaited report on local watercourse depletion later this month. A resident with relevant expertise has offered support once I review it. For now, our stream remains entirely dry and will need sustained rainfall to recover.

VICAR'S LETTER

Dear Friends, As autumn brings colder days, we reach for woollies and check our boilers. Before the Industrial Revolution, when people relied on candles, furs, and fires for warmth, the long winter nights shaped lives differently. Darkness and cold forced rest, reflection, and indoor tasks such as spinning, sewing, reading (for the literate), prayer, and food preparation. Longer sleep offered recovery after the demanding summer months of producing food and drink. As the American statesman once said: *“The time will come when winter will ask what you were doing all summer.”*

Today, modern comforts let us override these natural rhythms, but I wonder whether our bodies have truly adjusted. Thousands of years shaped our biological clocks, and it seems to me we should embrace winter as a season of reflection and rest. If summer nurtures activity, then winter can nurture prayerful stillness.

I too enjoy TV dramas and the evening news, but my wife wisely records the headlines so we can watch later in the evening—bringing bedtime forward by an hour. Simple changes like reducing screen time allow earlier nights and calmer mornings, which become fruitful opportunities for prayer and scripture. Dust off the Bible and Prayer Book: their psalms and prayers can deepen quiet reflection, helping us to “commune with your own heart... and be still” (Psalm 4).





